1. General

Please submit your contribution as a Word and a PDF Document to the editorial board.

The review should be about 1500 words long. The planned processing time is 6 months. Each review is preceded by a review header with details of the publication to be reviewed:

2. Formatting guidelines

- Times New Roman, 12 pt; Footnotes in 10 pt, Line spacing: 1,5
- Please refrain from using (automatic) hyphenation.
- Highlighting words or phrases (e.g. terms or speech examples) is done in *italics*. Please avoid using **Bold** or underline where possible. Do not use CAPITAL LETTERS!
- Meanings and translations of a term or phrase and translations are enclosed in single curved quotation marks (‘. . .’, 6 and 9).

3. Guidelines for formatting short bibliographic references in text

All quotations must be referenced. References are made by means of a short reference in the text (not in a footnote):

- Two authors are separated with an “and”: Müller and Meier (1988)
- If there are more than two authors, please use “et al.”: Müller et al. (1988)
- In-text citation: Müller (2011: 54)
- In-text citation within brackets: (see Müller 2011: 54)
- Multiple citations within brackets. (Müller 2011, 2012, Meier 2013)

- For page ranges, please use a dash: 23–24
- Avoid abbreviations such as “ibid.”. Always provide the complete page range and the full bibliographic reference.
- Please also reference paraphrased text within the text, not in the footnote. (cf. Müller 2011: 54)
- Every in-text citation must also be referenced in the bibliography.

4. Guidelines for the formatting of the bibliography

- Only include references in the bibliography that are included within the text.
- The bibliography is sorted alphabetically.
- Multiple texts by the same author/authors are sorted chronologically by ascending years. Identical publishing years are marked with “a, b, c” etc.
- Only the first publishing place is named, all others are written with “et al.”
- Website references: URL: <www.deutscher-sprachatlas.de> [Accessed on: 17.01.2023].
- All authors and editors are named in the bibliographic reference. (“et al.” is not used)
- Pay attention to complete and correct literature references. Also include subtitles and series titles.
- A single page is preceded by “p.”, a page range is preceded by “pp.”
- If there is one editor, please precede the name with “ed.”, if there are multiple then “eds.”
